Dear Executive Director Glazier:

This office has received your request for a written Attorney General Opinion regarding action that the Oklahoma Board of Nursing intends to take pursuant to an agreed order in case 6.029.19. The licensee voluntarily entered the Board's Peer Assistance Program ("PAP"), but has now defaulted from that program. Due to this default, the license has been automatically suspended pursuant to 59 O.S.Supp.2018, § 567.17(I). The licensee has now requested to voluntarily surrender the license. The Board proposes to accept the surrender for two years and require the licensee to meet the Board's guidelines for reinstatement. Upon reinstatement, the license will be immediately, temporarily suspended pending admission to PAP. If PAP is not completed, the license will be revoked for five years and the licensee must meet the Board's guidelines for reinstatement and the licensee will be required to pay an administrative penalty of \$3,500.

The Oklahoma Nursing Practice Act authorizes the Board to impose discipline when a nurse "fails to adequately care for patients or to conform to the minimum standards of acceptable nursing" in a way that "unnecessarily exposes a patient or other person to risk of harm," "[i]s intemperate in the use of alcohol or drugs," "is guilty of unprofessional conduct," "[i]s guilty of any act that jeopardizes a patient's life, health or safety," has violated state or federal law related to nursing, or "[h]as defaulted from [PAP] for any reason." 59 O.S.Supp.2018, § 567.8(B)(3-4), (7-9), (11). The Board may reasonably believe that the proposed action is necessary to deter future violations.

It is, therefore, the official opinion of the Attorney General that the Oklahoma Board of Nursing has adequate support for the conclusion that this action advances the State's policy to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring nurses meet minimum standards of professional conduct.
